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<u>V+J</u> <u>Sixth Sunday of Easter</u> <u>May 5, 2024</u> <u>Salesian Reflection</u>

In today's Gospel, we experience Jesus telling us to remain in His love. By remaining in His love, we will learn to love one another. St. Francis de Sales notes:

Love causes us to be like what we love. We are given a natural inclination to love God. Moreover, we are commanded to love God and the things of God above all other things. Alas, we are like the eagles that have greater power of sight than flight. While we see how worthy of love God's goodness is, we have less strength of will for loving it.

Yet, this human heart of ours is capable of producing certain beginnings of love for God. But to advance to the true maturity of love, that is, to love God and all the things of God, we need divine love. Through God's goodness, our spirits are raised up and united with God's love. Overflowing with divine love, we come back to share this pure love with others.

To love God without loving the neighbor is impossible. God has chosen us as children and thus we must show that we are truly God's children by loving one another dearly in all goodness of heart. Our Savior, in coming into the world, raised our nature higher than all the angels and has made us so like Himself, that we can say that we resemble God perfectly. In becoming human, Our Lord has taken on our likeness and has given us His. Oh, how earnestly we ought to summon up our courage to live according to what we are! Imitate as perfectly as possible Him, who came into this world to teach us what we need to do: to preserve in ourselves this divine resemblance.

It is this divine resemblance only that we are called to love and honor in our neighbor. Is this not a powerful motive to have for loving each other?

All nations, which have a union of hearts that reflect the image of God, will surely be filled with joy.

En el Evangelio de hoy Jesús nos dice que debemos permanecer en Su amor, y que al hacer esto nosotros aprenderemos a amarnos los unos a los otros. Al respecto, San Francisco de Sales hace la siguiente observación:

El amor nos lleva a adoptar la apariencia de todo aquello que amamos. Todos nosotros hemos sido otorgados una inclinación natural a amar a Dios. Sumado a esto los mandamientos nos ordenan amar a Dios, y a las cosas de Dios, por sobre todo lo demás. Desafortunadamente, a veces somos como águilas que poseen una visión bastante aguda pero que demuestran poco poder a la hora de volar. A veces, aún cuando somos conscientes de que la bondad de Dios es digna de nuestro amor, demostramos muy poca fuerza de voluntad para demostrar ese amor. Aún así, nuestro corazón humano posee total capacidad para generar algunas manifestaciones iniciales de amor por Dios. Pero para que podamos alcanzar una verdadera madurez en el amor, ósea, para poder amar a Dios y a todas las cosas Dios, necesitamos del amor divino. Es por obra de la bondad de Dios que nuestro espíritu se eleva y logra unirse al amor de Nuestro Señor. Desbordados por el amor divino, regresamos entonces a compartir ese amor puro con nuestros semejantes. Pretender amar a Dios sin amar a nuestros hermanos es imposible. Dios nos ha escogido como Sus hijos, por lo tanto nosotros estamos en la obligación de demostrar que lo somos amándonos los unos a los otros como hermanos, e invirtiendo en dicho empeño toda la bondad que puedan albergar nuestros corazones. En el momento en que decidió venir al mundo Nuestro Salvador elevó nuestra naturaleza por encima de la de los ángeles, y nos hizo tan a Su imagen y semejanza que podemos decir sin duda que somos un fiel reflejo de Dios. 

MAY IS...the MONTH OF MARY Why do we honor Mary during May?

The month of May is a special time for Catholics to honor our Blessed Mother Mary.

• During this month Catholics, both in church and at home, offer up to Mary from their hearts prayer and reverence.

• It's the month we honor Blessed Mary as the Mother of Jesus and our Heavenly Mother.

• Mary has an unique role in salvation history as the Mother of God, conceived without Sin, who by her own freewill agreed to bring the "Word made flesh," (John 1:14) our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, into the world.

How do we honor Mary in May?

Have a Procession and Crowning of Mary with flowers.

• Make a May altar with a statue or picture of Mary as a reminder of her special month.

• **Praying the Hail Mary** - We pray with her and ask her to pray for us and for God's grace to fall on us.

- Praying the Rosary
- Praying a Novena

• Reciting the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary Crowning of Mary Procession

It's a Catholic tradition to honor Mary during the month of May by crowning her statue with flowers. The reason we crown Mary is best summed up by Pope Paul VI, who wrote in 1965 that May is an occasion for a "moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world pay to the Queen of Heaven." The crown symbol is attributed to Mary because she is the Mother of the Son of God, who is our Heavenly King.



This weekend, (May 4 & 5, 2024), our brothers and sisters representing the Land of Peace mission a nonprofit organization - will be with us, speaking about the Christian situation in the Holy Land and The Holy Land Pilgrimage, and selling Crucifixes, religious artwork, and rosaries - all made of olive wood, which is native to Israel and Bethlehem. Christian families in the Holy land, who depend on tourists, have been greatly affected. The goal of this mission is to help the poor and needy families in Bethlehem and Jerusalem. How can we tell about May as the month dedicated to the Virgin Mary to the youngest ones? Does imposing them to recite the Rosary or other May prayers make any sense? Of course it does, even if we must explain things in a way that makes them easily understandable. Children are always happy and friendly when it comes to learning new things, especially if those things are close to their sensitivity.

First, we'll need to explain that the month of May is dedicated to Mary, mother of Jesus, because it is the month of flowers, when nature awakens to a new life after the rigidity of winter. And Mary, Virgin and Mother, daughter to her own Son, is the most beautiful among flowers, the first one to bloom after Christ's rebirth thanks to His promise of salvation for all humankind. Moreover, the Virgin Mary, freed from the original sin and any other guilt, is a symbol of that promise of forgiveness and love herself, a wonderful flower given by God to the world as a sign of His endless generosity. We can explain to children how the prayer of the Rosary, symbol of Marian devotion was born. The most characteristic flower of May is the rose, and in ancient times, children used to decorate Mary statues with crowns of roses. Each rose symbolized a prayer, a beautiful and scented prayer, worthy of the Virgin Mary. The beads that compose the Rosary come from those roses.

For the youngest ones, we must remind them that Mary is not only Jesus' mother, but also everyone's mother: the most beautiful, the sweetest and loving of all mothers, always reaching out to all of her children to protect them, comfort them and take care of them even during difficult times.
